Where to Look in the Library

Books and DVDs on employment, career development, test preparation, certification, and other topics relevant to advancing your job search, skills, and general employability can be found throughout our collections.

Study guides for Civil Service tests are located in several areas depending on the job title. For example, Civil Service examinations for law-related jobs are in the 340s, the general area where Law books are.

An Entire Library System of Materials

As a member of Middletown Thrall Library, or any library within the Ramapo Catskill Library System (RCLS), you are privileged to locate and request circulating items from any RCLS library.

What this means: if Thrall does not own a book (such as a specific study guide) you need, there is still a chance of locating it within the library system and having it delivered to Thrall so you can pick it up and return it just like a regular book from our library.

Notifications of an item's arrival can be made either by postcard (which costs \$.35 per request) or by e-mail (free).

At times (especially near exam dates) there can be delays (from days to weeks) until items become available, so we encourage you to inquire about books well before you need them.

Employment Topics & Related Subject Headings in the Library Catalog
