### From Our Library Director Matt Pfisterer

#### Library Budget and Trustee Vote October 7, 2014

The public vote on the proposed **2015 Library District Budget and Election of Trustees** will be held in the **Reading Room** of the Middletown Thrall Library (11-19 Depot Street Middletown, NY 10940) from 8:00 am – 8:00 pm on Tuesday, October 7, 2014. Those who wish to vote prior to 9:00 AM can enter from one of two entrances located on the Depot Street side of the building. All registered voters who reside in the **Thrall Public Library District** are eligible to vote. This includes residents of the Enlarged City School District of Middletown, residents of the Town of Mt. Hope who reside within the Pine Bush Central School District, and residents of the Town of Walkkill who reside within the Pine Bush Central School District, Valley Central School District, or Minisink Valley Central School District.

The proposed budget will increase the tax levy by \$57,466.00 or 1.98% over the previous year. The proposed Library District tax levy for 2015 is \$2,953,737.00. The proposed gross operating budget for 2015 is \$3,435,637.00 representing an increase of 2.3% from the previous year. This budget reflects an effort to maintain library district resources at their current levels and a desire to keep budget and tax levy increases to a minimum. We continue to be grateful for the generous support we receive from the **Friends of Middletown Thrall Library**. This support allows us to purchase furniture and equipment and greatly enhances our ability to provide quality materials and programs to our community.

Currently there is one trustee (**Carl S. Berkowitz**) running unopposed for a four year term on Thrall Public Library District's Board of Trustees.



## From Our Government Information Librarian, Karen Heil


*I think that I shall never see/

Fall has arrived, and, hopefully, its beautiful colors will not be too far behind. Even the government pays careful attention to our trees. The **Department of Agriculture** ([usda.gov](http://usda.gov)) has produced some interesting, informative and delightful documents centered on trees. One of the newest, **Why Would Anyone Cut a Tree Down?**, is a beautifully illustrated book for children.



We are surrounded every day by items produced from the forest: our homes, our books and magazines, that syrup on your morning pancakes. To understand the cambium layer or cellulose fibers and lignin read **How a Tree Grows** or **A Little Acorn**.



For the gardeners out there, try **How to Prune Trees** or **Fruitful Legacy: A Historic Context of Orchards in the United States**, with **Technical Information for Registering Orchards in the National Register of Historic Places** or **How to Recognize Hazardous Defects in Trees**.

For the entrepreneur, helpful titles include the **Nursery Manual for Native Plants: A Guide for Tribal Nurseries** and **Profitable Farms and Woodlands: A Practical Guide in Agroforestry for Landowners, Farmers and Ranchers**.

Trees protect us from the sun, provide homes for animals, nurture the soil, help purify the air, and give us food and materials that make our lives better. Celebrate them, enjoy them by reading **A Botanic Garden for the Nation**. Come and learn their story!

## From the Local History Librarian Charles P. DeYoe, III

As many patrons are already aware, we maintain a large collection of **newspapers published in Middletown** on microfilm. While our collection is extensive, due to the *unavailability* of some very *old* materials, it has always been incomplete. However the collection of our historical newspapers is going to soon be growing!

Earlier this year, a generous patron donated a bound collection of the **Middletown Evening Press** containing papers from 1870. These newspapers are currently being photographed onto **microfilm** and will be available for the general public to use this autumn.

This represents the first time individuals will be able to access these newspapers since they were first published **over 140 years ago!** The microfilming is also an important step towards ensuring Middletown's rich history for future generations.

While a specific date for when the newspapers will be added to the collection is still unknown, they should be available by **November** of this year.


