“The Latest From The Friends of MTL, Inc.”

The latest benefits to the library from the work of the Friends of Middletown Thrall Library, Inc. come in a variety of formats, for all ages! This summer, they have provided funding for two programs for children and families - "Let's Fly Kites", with the "Kite Man" Charles Stewart. (Tuesday, July 12th, at 2:00pm); and "Stories and Songs of Latin America" with Felix Pitre (Wed., Aug. 3rd, at 7:00pm.) They are also providing support for a delicious program for young adults "Oodles of Noodles" with Norma Chang on Thursday, July 21st, at noon.

Our reference collection will see the addition of the new edition of the six-volume set *New Dictionary of the History of Ideas*. This is an entirely new edition of the original work, which was published in 1974. It has more listings on non-European sources than the original work, and many new topics. Also, with the addition of this set to the reference shelves, it will enable us to move the original edition to the circulating collection.

In the audio-visual realm, they approved funding for a variety of new DVD titles of classic television shows. Included are such shows as *Sid Caesar*, *Judy Garland*, *Ed Sullivan*, *Saturday Night Live*, *Tom & Jerry*, and many more. Additionally, funding was provided for the purchase of many non-fiction DVDs. 1. *Opening Reception* – Wed., June 29, 7 – 8:30 pm
Keynote Speaker Major David Siry, United States Military Academy, Dept. of History, West Point. Lecture: Lincoln and Liberty: the Evolution of an Idea.

2. *Lincoln in Literature* - Wed., July 6, 7 – 8:30 pm
Lecture by Chris Godwin, Chair, Orange County Community College, Dept. of English & Foreign Languages.

3. *Music of the Civil War & Beyond* - Sat., July 9, 7 – 9 pm
Concert by nationally known performers Jay Ungar and Molly Mason at the PARAMOUNT THEATRE, 17 South Street, Middletown, NY. Get to the Theatre early for the best seats. We reserve the right to limit seating if necessary.

4. *Civil War Women: Their Roles and Their Legacies* - Tue., July 12, 7 – 8 pm. Talk by Trish Chambers who last spoke on the "Freedom Quilt" for the Friends of Middletown Thrall Library.

5. *The Civil War as Seen through the Eyes of the Children* – Sat., July 16, 10:30 – 11:30 am Bring the children to listen to costumed presenter Yvonne Bigney.

6. *Glory* – Tuesday, July 19, 7 – 9 pm. A dramatic film account of the Civil War's first all-black regiment, led by a idealistic, privileged, northern white commander, fighting not only the enemy, but also convention and prejudice.

7. *What Did Our Local Soldiers Think of Abraham Lincoln?* - Thurs., July 28, 7 – 8 pm. Captain of the "Orange Blossoms" and well known scholar/Civil War re-enactor Chuck LaRocca will talk about local soldiers views and read from their diaries and letters home, includes slide presentation.

8. *Civil War Soldiers in Encampment* – Saturday, July 30, 10:30 am – 1:00 pm. Costumed re-enactors from the 124th NYSV regiment will re-create a Civil War environment with materials that would be familiar to a Civil War soldier. The entire family will enjoy listening to these experts and asking questions about life as a Union soldier. The encampment location will be outside the library in the adjacent vacant lot or upstairs in the Community Room in the event of extreme bad weather.

9. *Lincoln, Booth and Ford's Theatre: A Look Back* - Tuesday, August 2, 7:00 – 8:30 pm. This presentation takes on the mood of a documentary with a narrator, two performers, and a short video to bring history to life. Enjoy Chris Farlekas, Times-Herald Record columnist, and Ken Tschen, local community actor in this program.

On the Horizon...

Sometime in August the entire Ramapo Catskill Library System is scheduled to switch over to a computerized library system called "Horizon." During this time there may be brief periods in which the library catalog or other library functions may not be available. As always, we will be ready and eager to assist you during this transitional period.

Horizon 7.4, a product developed by Dynix (now called SirsiDynix due to its recent merger with another company called Sirsi), will alter technical procedures conducted "behind the scenes" by library staff members, including such things as looking up titles and processing items before they enter our reference or circulating collections.

The public library catalog interface (known as HIP – Horizon Information Portal) – the one you use at home through thrall.org or at the library – is expected to undergo a much simpler upgrade that should not alter the way you currently look up items in the catalog.
