Cool Times in the Hot Summer at Your Library

Summer is approaching, and as the temperatures begin to heat up you can look forward to some cool times at the Library. We are gearing up for our "Summer Reading Program" which will provide an opportunity for families to attend a wide variety of educational and entertaining programs. Studies have shown that school aged children who participate in Summer Reading Programs are less likely to experience a decline in core literacy skills during the school break and are better prepared when they return to school in the Fall.

The summer months are also a time when the number of people coming to the Library will increase. In order to ensure that everyone is able to have the best possible experience at the library, please take note of the following:

- Loitering in the building or on Library grounds is not permitted
- Cell phone use is prohibited throughout the Library
- Young children should not be left unattended
- Adults with children in strollers are requested to use the Children's Library and computers on the second floor. (elevator is located to the right as you enter the building)
- Short term internet computers are available to all who come to the library for either 10 or 20 minute sessions on a first come first served basis. If you need extended time to use the internet, consider obtaining a Library card which will allow you to schedule longer sessions at our computers.
- The Library's "Reading Room" located through the archway is the only quiet study area in the building. Talking is not permitted in the Library's Reading Room.

"Pollinators are responsible for assisting over 80% of the world's flowering plants. Without them, humans and wildlife wouldn't have much to eat or look at! Animals that assist plants in their reproduction as pollinators include species of ants, bats, bees, beetles, birds, butterflies, flies, moths, wasps, as well as other unusual animals. Wind and water also play a role in the pollination of many plants." www.fs.fed.us/wildflowers/pollinators/)

You know its soon to be Summer when every outdoor surface is covered with yellow pollen, the rhododendrons and azalea bushes are bright with color, tulips, daffodils and of course dandelions are popping up all over the place. But one sure sign of Spring is becoming less evident every year. The beautiful flowering cherry blossom tree in my yard is usually buzzing with the sounds of what seems like a million bees. This year is too quiet. Just a few bees, a few butterflies and a rare bat sighting. It's complicated figuring out why our pollinators are disappearing. Maybe its habitat loss or pesticide exposure, a new disease or mite infestation or maybe even an increase in cell tower activity. The United States Department of Agriculture Forest Service has a terrific website devoted to pollinators with spotlights on animal pollinators, gardening practices, the monarch butterfly and creating special habitats for hummingbirds, bees and bats. If you want more information on the political side of the problem, do a search using the Government Publishing Office Federal Digital System website to discover what bills are pending or to Congressional Hearings (www.gpo.gov/fdsys/). According to the latest news online, even Morgan Freeman has transformed his 124 acre ranch in Mississippi into a honeybee refuge, planting all their favorites! Let's bring the pollinators back to protect our economy and our environment!
